Below you will find six excerpts from the texts in the required readings list. Read them and answer the questions in connection with them! Unless explicitly stated, the questions refer to the whole of the text, not only the selection! (45 points)

II/1

There came a wild pigeon into our ship, and another small land bird. [...] At Watertown there was (in the view of divers witnesses) a great combat between a mouse and a snake; and, after a long fight, the mousci prevailed and killed the snake. The pastor of Boston, Mr. Wilson, a very sincere, holy man, hearing of it, gave this interpretation: That the snake was the devil; the mouse was a poor contemptible people, which God had brought hither, which should overcome Satan here, and dispossess him of his kingdom.

i. Give the author and title of the text! (2)

ii. Which religious movement is the author associated with? (1)

iii. How was America seen by the followers of this movement, and what did they regard as their mission? Support your arguments with images from the text! (3)

## II/2
