# Multiculturalism – Melting Pot or Salad Bowl?

**1** Read the following text with special attention to the words in bold.

The United States is a society of immigrants. The promise of wealth, land, and freedom has attracted more than 50 million newcomers since the nation's beginnings. Over the years, the US has admitted more immigrants than any other country in history. This trend has continued up till the present day: 700,000 legal immigrants enter the US yearly.

Among the first settlers the English were the most numerous, and thus their language and culture had the overriding influence. American society was from the beginning predominantly English, shaped by white Anglo-Saxon Protestants (WASPs). Early immigrants of other nations included Germans, who settled in Pennsylvania, and Dutch, who founded

the city of New York (originally called New Amsterdam). Africans provided slave labor in the southern colonies.

Although immigration to the US has been continuous, two great waves can be distinguished. The so-called "Old Immigration" in the first half of the 19th century brought predominantly Irish, Scandinavian, and German immigrants in vast numbers. The potato famine in Ireland drove one-fifth of the country's population (about 1.5 million people) to the US between 1840 and 1855. Around the turn of the century the "New Immigration" began: between 1880 and 1910 most of the people came from Southern and Eastern Europe, including 2.2 million from the Austro-Hungarian



**M**agyarországról, illetve az Osztrák-Magyar Monarchiából először főleg a második bevándorlási hullámmal érkeztek magyarok Amerikába. Legtöbben a jobb állások és a magasabb életszínvonal reményében hagyta el hazájukat. A kivándorlók száma az I. világháború után erősen lecsökkent, mivel az USA kvótákat állított fel a bevándorlás korlátozása céljából, de a folyamat nem szakadt meg egészen: a fasizmus korszakában ismét sokan kényszerültek az Újvilágban letelepedni, köztük számos híres művész és kiváló tudós. ### Say the Right Thing at the Right Time – Political Correctness

**I** Read the following text with special attention to the words in bold.

In America there are no *Negroes*, *colored*, or *Blacks*, only “African-Americans,” and there are no *chairmen* or *chairwomen*, only “*chairpersons*” – at least in the “politically correct” (abbreviated as “PC”) language use which consciously avoids any racial, sexual, physical, class, or age discrimina-

tion. In “PC” it is not allowed to say, for example, *sect* for a sect, we may only refer to it as a “*religion*” or “new religious movement”, nor can we call somebody *short*; we may only describe him as “vertically challenged”. Similar rules apply to many words which are in some ways connected to racial
